The Wisdom of Others

Someone once said: "All wisdom is plagiarism. Only stupidity is original."

A strange thing to say, but true. Even those who have truly been innovators: Freud, Salk, Moses, etc., depended on the work of others who came before them to make their special contributions to the advancement of human understanding. Some of that previous work was helpful and led them down productive paths. Some was helpful in that it helped prevent their wasting their time on unproductive ones.

For the rest of us, we need the wisdom of others even more. Are we really interested in re-inventing the wheel every time we need to do something? Especially in the area of ethical and moral decisions, are we really willing to base them on nothing more than our own personal tastes or whims?

Jewish tradition is a wonderful compendium of over four thousand years of wisdom. We would be foolish not to learn from it.

For instance, on telling the truth:

Rabbi Elimelech said: "I am sure of my share in the World-to-Come. When I stand to plead before the bar of the Heavenly Tribunal, I will be asked: 'Did you study Torah?' To this I will answer: 'No.' Again, I will be asked: 'Did you pray?' Again my answer will be: 'No.' The third question will be: 'Did you do good?' And for the third time I will answer: 'No.' Then judgment will be awarded in my favor, for I will have spoken the truth."

Or, on perfection:

Only G-d is perfect. Our actions must be basically defective in part. If one believes his or her good deed or holy study to be thoroughly pure and perfect, this is a sure sign that they are thoroughly bad.

On the unimportance of possessions:

Around the end of the nineteenth century, a tourist from the United States visited the famous Polish rabbi, Chafetz Chaim.

He was astonished to see that the rabbi's home was just a simple room filled with books. The only furniture was a table and a bench.

"Rabbi, where is your furniture?" asked the tourist.

"Where is yours?" replied the Chafetz Chaim.

"Mine? But I am only a visitor here."

"So am I," said the rabbi.

And so are we all. We are not here long enough to start everything all over from scratch. Especially in these chaotic times, let us, as the proverb says, number our days, know their fleeting passage, and learn from our rich tradition that we might truly get us a heart of wisdom.



President's Column

We participate in life's opportunities to varying degrees. And so it is with things involving Temple Beth Sholom, specifically, and Jewish life, in general.

During High Holy Days, I asked you to participate in Temple life. Since then, did you join a committee; volunteer for a single activity; attend a function; join a group; come to a Shabbat or some other religious observance? I certainly hope so, but whether you did or not, there is an observance coming up in November that I really urge you to think about "observing".

It is **KRYSTALLNACHT**- the terribly tragic event that occurred on November 9, 1938.

Krystallnacht, or The Night of Broken Glass, was a two day pogrom of murder and destruction in Nazi Germany. This horrendous action was the response of Germany to the assassination of a German political officer in France. Hitler's Chief of Propaganda, the infamous Joseph Goebbels, described the assassination as a conspiracy by "international Jewry" against the German Reich and justified the orgy of destruction as a proper response of the Third Reich to protect itself.

Beginning on November 9, described on American calendars as 11/9 and for numerology buffs, described as 9/11 using the European calendar dating, rampaging mobs throughout Germany and the newly enslaved Austria and Sudetenland attacked Jews in the street, in their homes and at their places of work and worship. It has been reported that about one hundred Jews were killed and certainly hundreds more injured. At least 1,000 synagogues were burned, thousands of Jewish-owned businesses were destroyed. Schools, cemeteries and

neighborhoods were vandalized; and then more than 30,000 Jews were arrested and sent to concentration camps.

So, why should we remember this event? So we can insure that "NEVER AGAIN" will such a thing happen!!! Most of the adults of the Congregation grew up in a world where at least overt anti-Semitism was not as visible as in the 1930's and 1940's. And as we grow older, we must remember and pass on the knowledge of this horrific event to our children and grandchildren. Otherwise, the revisionist historians who spout hate will go on and on and on... Just think about Iran's President Mahmūd Ahmadinejād and his absurd and insane lies about Jews, Israel and the truth of The Holocaust.

We must always remember the past and we must fight back to insure that the future does not see such a horror ever again!

So, in early November, people of many faiths, but predominantly the part of the local Jewish population who cares, will gather on the steps of the Rockland Courthouse in New City to recall with sadness that terrible night so long ago. And let us preserve and protect our heritage so that it never happens again!

PLEASE MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO ATTEND AND PARTICIPATE!!

Let us assemble to keep alive the memories of those who suffered in an event that was at the start of what was certainly one of the very worst tragedies to befall our People. And let us join together as we recite the kaddish and also say a prayer that peace and goodness will flourish.

It is so important for children to see their parents model the concept of tikkun olam (repairing the world) by sharing their good fortune with others in need. We continue collecting tzedakah every Friday as we celebrate Shabbat and at the end of the year we donate a considerable amount of money to many worthwhile organizations. Past recipients of our tzedakah fund have been The Israel Guide Dog Foundation, The Family Reading Partnership, Mazon, Jewish National Fund (planting trees in Israel), and Shalva (a facility for challenged children in Israel). This year we are going to work with a new organization called Bottles for Babies. This is an

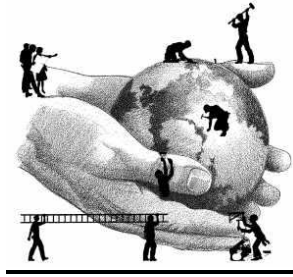

They collect gently used bottles, clothing, toys, etc. and send the supplies to two orphanages in Guatemala who are in desperate need of supplies. A MESSAGE FROM OUR RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



Responsibility! We should protect the rights and well-being of others just as we would do for ourselves. To care about people. Tikkun Olam, a Hebrew expression, means to repair or fix the world. Obviously, we cannot fix the whole world, but we CAN make it a lot better. Whenever possible, even if it's only one good thing, do a Mitzvah. You will be surprised how important that is and how good it makes you feel. The word MITZVAH means commandment. G-d commands us to do good deeds. Please participate this month in our Religious School and TBS Social Action Committees' "Mitzvah of Giving" activities.

We know that students learn by doing. From their own experiences, children learn that practicing *mitzvot* makes them feel good. In our Religious School we begin in the lower grades by discussing specific *mitzvot* that our children can carry out in their daily lives; respecting parents, being kind to animals, visiting the sick and so much more. We help students find ways of putting these ideals and values into action. In November, our entire school will have a food drive to symbolically share the harvest with those served by Rockland's People to People. Our students will pack up boxes of holiday food and make holiday decorations to be delivered throughout the county. They will also help prepare home-cooked Thanksgiving dinners for several families in Rockland County.

From studies and activities, even our young children can start to understand Jewish ethical teachings. These simple but profound lessons lay the groundwork for a lifetime of *mitzvot*. As our children continue through Religious School, this foundation will grow even deeper and stronger.

At this time of the year I encourage you to read the following with your children and discuss the meaning of "*hakarot ha'tov*" – recognition of all that G-d has given us to be thankful for.

- If you have food in the refrigerator, clothes on your back, a roof overhead and a place to sleep...you are richer than 75% of the world.
- If you have money in the bank, in your wallet, and spare change in a dish someplace...you are among the top 8% of the worlds' wealthy.
- If you woke up this morning with more health than illness...you are more blessed than the million who will not survive this week.
- If you have never experienced the danger of battle, the loneliness of imprisonment, the agony of torture or the pangs of starvation...you are ahead of 500 million people in the world.
- If you can attend a religious meeting without fear of harassment, arrest, torture, or death...you are more blessed than 3 billion people in the world.
- If you hold up your head with a smile on your face and are truly thankful...you are blessed because the majority can, but most do not.
- If you can hold someone's hand, hug them or even touch them on the shoulder...you are blessed because you can offer healing touch.

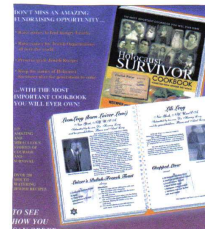
